



ANNUAL WATER QUALITY REPORT FOR 2022

The Southwest Regional Water District is pleased to provide to you this year's Annual Water Quality Report. This report is designed to inform you about the quality water and services we deliver to you every day. Our constant goal is to provide you with a safe and dependable supply of drinking water. We want you to understand the efforts we make to continually improve our water distribution system operation, water treatment process, and to protect our water resources. We are committed to ensuring the quality of your water. The Southwest Regional Water District is classified by the State of Iowa as a Grade II Water Distribution System and a Grade II Water Treatment Plant facility. Our water supplies are purchased from the City of Clarinda, the City of Red Oak, and 2 wells owned by SWRWD. The Clarinda water source is water from the West Nodaway River. The City of Clarinda filters and treats the water through their water plant constructed in 2007. The Rural Water District then pumps from the Clarinda Water system into the 500,000-gallon elevated tank located 3 miles west of the City on Highway 2 and serves the East Service Area of our rural system. The Red Oak water source is from wells which draw from the Dakota Aquifer. The water is chlorinated and treated at each well site by Red Oak and then is rechlorinated and pumped by the Water District into the 500,000-gallon elevated tank located 1 mile east of Red Oak off Highway 34. The wells constructed East of Red Oak on K Ave. in 2021 also pump form the Dakota Aquifer. SWRWD chlorinates the water that is then sent to the Montgomery County tank. These supplies provide service to the West Service Area of our rural water system. The Southwest Regional Water District system covers over 945 miles of water distribution pipeline in the counties of Page, Montgomery, Fremont, and Taylor in southwest Iowa and extends some service to users in Missouri. Today the rural water system has 2091 rural service connections and provides water service to eleven



Board of Supervisors approve pay increases for elected officials

The Montgomery County Board of Supervisors has agreed to proposed pay increases for elected officials.

At the regular meeting April 18, the supervisors discussed a resolution setting salaries for the 2023-24 fiscal year. The salary increases were based off of recommendations from the Montgomery County Compensation Board.

At the meeting, the compensation board recommended a 12% overall increase to the salaries of the county auditor, county attorney, supervisors, and treasurer, and a 15% increase for the county sheriff.

After budget discussions, the supervisors agreed to a 6% increase for the auditor, county attorney, recorder, and treasurer, a 7.5% increase for the county sheriff, and a 4.8% increase for the supervi-

As per those increases, the county auditor's salary is increased to \$67,478, country attorney, treasurer, and recorder to \$66,842, sheriff to \$93,435, and supervisors to \$28,236.

Supervisor Donna Robinson said during budget discussions, the supervisors discussed no salary increases for themselves, but in the end chose a lesser amount.

"We discovered it would not be that much of a cost savings, and if we keep this as low as it is, as time goes on, there will be very few people who want to run for this office, so we made the adjustment from the 6% to 4.8%," Robinson explained.

The supervisors approved the salary increases as presented.

The supervisors also discussed a potential increase to the county's mileage reimbursement rate. The current mileage rate is 58.5 cents per mile, and the Internal Revenue Service issued a new civic standard for 2023 that beginning on Jan. 1, the standard mileage rate was being increased to 65.5 cents per mile.

Upon reviewing the documentation, Robinson said if the county

was looking for cost savings, no change was necessary.

"Just because that's the rate that has been presented doesn't mean that we have to accept that or implement that. We were below 58.5 cents for a long time, and we only increased it to that amount, I believe, last year," Robinson commented. "It's up to the board to decide or choose what we're comfortable with.'

News / Sports

Supervisors Charla Schmid said she sits on the Zion Recovery Services Board, and her mileage reimbursement was for less than that amount, and the board did not follow guidelines from the IRS.

County Auditor Jill Ozuna said if the board agreed to change the amount, it needed to be effective April 18.

"It needs to be specified that it's not retroactive, so people submitting claims the prior week will not be getting reimbursed with the new mileage rate," Ozuna advised.

Schmid was not in favor of the full amount, but suggested a compromise to the numbers.

"We could increase the mileage rate to 60.5 cents. Gas prices aren't going down; they're increasing actually," Schmid said.

Robinson said she was in support of either decision, be it to leave the rate as it was, or raise it to Schmid's suggested 60.5 cents.

Schmid motioned to increase the mileage to 60.5 cents. The motion was passed unanimously.

In other business, the supervisors:

Approved a resolution assigning a memorandum of understanding with Zion Recovery Services, Inc. for opioid settlement funds. Ozuna estimated the settlement funding to be roughly \$90,000.

Approved a resolution proposed by weed superintendent Damian Bond for the destruction of noxious weeds. Supervisor Mark Peterson said the items posed by the resolution were the same as the resolution approved last year.

County engineer Karen Albert advised the supervisors that beginning May 1, crews will work 10 hours days Monday-Thursday. On Memorial Day and July 4, the crews will work eight hour days, and they will resume five eight hour days after the Labor Day weekend.

Drake Relays

Charm Carpenter The Red Oak Express

The Drake Relays is an outdoor track and field event held in Des Moines at Drake University, and began in 1910.

In January 2018 Drake Relays unveiled the Blue Standard, under which Iowa's top high school athletes automatically qualify based on their event performance. The Blue Standard is the top 25% of accepted entrant's results from past Drake Relays.

The top 16 entries in the 800m, 4X800, and shuttle hurdle relay compete. The top 21 entries for the 1500m/1600m and 3000m/3200m compete. The top 24 entries in the 4X200, 4X400, medley relays, and all field events compete. The top 96 4X100 entries compete.

This year, the Drake Relays will be held for high school athletes beginning on Wednesday, April 26 and running through

Saturday, April 29.

Our coverage area has three entries in this year's event.

Southwest Valley senior Marshall Knapp will compete in the boys high jump Thursday beginning at 4:30 p.m.

East Mills senior Emily Williams will compete in the 100m hurdles on Friday in the preliminaries at 8:30 a.m. Those advancing to the finals will compete at 10:33 a.m. the same morning.

Red Oak's 4X100 relay team of Landon Couse, Riley Fouts, Brayden Sifford, and Jack Kling will compete at 9:58 a.m. Saturday morning in the preliminaries. Those advancing to the finals will compete at 4:34 p.m.

Drake Relays is different from the state track meet, although Drake University hosts both events, and both are multi-day events.

To qualify for Drake Relays, Blue Standards can be reached at any track meet with correct timing. To qualify for the state meet, the final times, jumps, and throws all

occur on the same day, generally, in the same weather conditions.

In Class 4A, the top two place winners in each event plus the next 12 best performances statewide from qualifying meet place winners (1st through 8th) will advance to the state meet. In Class 3A and Class 2A, the top two place winners in each event plus the next eight performances statewide from qualifying meet place winners will advance. In Class 1A, the top place winner in each event plus the next 14 best performances statewide from qualifying meet place winners will advance to the state meet.


There will be no more than 24 qualifiers in any event in any classification.

Sites for the state qualifying meets have been released, but assignments have not been released. The meets are all currently set for Thursday, May 11 in all classes for both boys

The state track meet is set for May 18-20.




