Dalton excited for new role as assessor

Montgomery County's new assessor is settling in.

Sharon Dalton, who previously served as assessor in Taylor County, started in her new position on June 13. Dalton said she sought the Montgomery County position because of a desire for change.

"The opportunity was there for a change, and I'm looking forward to being able to work with all of the people from the area, and the different work environment," Dalton said.

Dalton currently resides in Sharpsburg, and plans to commute. She said she's enjoying the move so far.

Bandstand project at park gets go ahead

The Red Oak City Council has agreed to provide additional funding to help kickstart the new bandstand project at Fountain Square Park.

The council discussed the additional funding, as well as the single bid received for the project at its regular meeting on June 20. Red Oak Park and Tree Board Chairman Bill Drey was on hand to discuss the project, and said the initial plans for the project were started in

Drey said the park board was in a situation where they were running out of time to act.

"We've got two hotel/motel tax grants, one for \$10,000 and the other for \$40,000. After talking with Jeanice Lester, it was determined those need to be spent by Sept. 22. They also told me that the grants are not going to be renewed again due to my renewing them several times in the past. We have to spend \$100,000 to be eligible for the \$50,000," Drey said.

Lester advised the council that they were not trying to be unreasonable in holding firm on the grants being spent.

"We're not hard-noses, but I would bet we've held over the grants four or five times, and the board members that issue those grants decided that it was time to move on with the project," Lester stated.

Drey advised the council the park and tree board currently ha \$179,943 in its local option sales tax funds that had been saved to pay for the project, though some of that funding had been earmarked for other projects, so less than \$179,000 was available. The current bid for the project, from Grand Contracting, LLC of Red Oak, was \$240,438.

City administrator Brad Wright said in the wake of the most recent bid that the project had been scaled back about as far as it possibly could.

"When we initially went out for bid, it included the roof with the project, but we've scaled it back even further to get something realistic that we could actually afford to build, as this thing came in way higher than what we'd originally anticipated. But as of now, this is the only bid we've received for the project, and based on construction costs being what they are right now, we thought that was fair," said Wright.

Drey advised that the prior bids for the project, which were rejected, were \$100,000 higher than the current bid from Grand Contracting. In addition to taking the roof off the project, Drey said there were other cuts

"We're not doing the electrical work right away, but the concrete work on the project will have the conduit in it so we can do the electrical work in another phase," explained

Wright said with the hotel/ motel grant funds, and the remaining funding available from LOST funds, the park board was requesting \$75,000 to make up the difference. If it was denied, the park board would need \$125,000 in funding to make up for losing the \$50,000 hotel/motel tax grants.

Lester said if the council approved the funding request, she could guarantee the hotel/ motel tax board would not rescind the \$50,000 in grants.

Wright said plans were to get started on the project in September, once all the summer events were completed, and the project itself to be completed in the late fall.

Councilperson Brian Bills asked where the \$75,000 in funding would come from. Wright said it would come from the general fund.

Bills said he had heard com-

Beware of poison hemlock, wild parsnip and poison ivy this summer

One of the joys of summer is getting out and enjoying nature, but not all nature's entire flora plays fair.

In Iowa, including Montgomery County, humans need to be aware of wild parsnip, poison ivy, poison hemlock and stinging nettles. Montgomery County Weeds Commissioner Damien Bond said all four weeds are at "full bore" currently. Bond has served as weed commissioned in Montgomery County for more than 20 years.

"The wet, cool temperatures this spring really helped them take off," said Bond.

The most infamous of the four weeds

hemlock resembles Queen Anne's Lace with large, white flowers. He added it usually grows in large clusters in moist, banks, irrigation ditches, hiking trails

and railroad right-of-ways. Standing as tall as 10 feet, with a smooth light green stem with purple spots or streaks, Bond said repeated mowing will eventually kill the poison hemlock, as well as the usage of 2-4-D. The younger the plant, the easier it is to kill, Bond added.

Bond said the roots are more toxic than the leaves and stems but all parts open areas along roadsides, stream of the plant, including the seed, are dangerous.

To induce poisoning, poison hemlock toxins must be ingested or enter through the eyes or nasal passages. Regardless, this plant should not be handled because sap on the skin can be rubbed into the eyes or accidentally ingested while handling food.

"It is easily identifiable and has a It is a biennial weed that doesn't rank odor associated with it when it's blooming," Bond described.

> Bond said he actively treats poison hemlock and asks county residents to

712-623-5197 if they see a patch on right of way adjacent to homes or county property. If on private property, Bond said landowners are asked to destroy it.

"Poison hemlock over the years has seemed to be the more aggressively growing one. I've seen it spread each year. I can't be everywhere all the time, so it's helpful when people let me know where they see it."

Poison hemlock isn't just dangerous to people, it can also be deadly to animals.

Bond said for the most part, livestock like cattle and horses will avoid it unless the grazing area has been overgrazed and it's the only thing left to eat. All parts of the plant are toxic to

Spunaugle proposes one time OHV inspection fee

Montgomery County is moving forward with a resolution setting inspection fees for off-highway vehicles, or OHVs, including allterrain vehicles, off-road motorcycles, and off-road utility vehicles, as well as water vessels, travel trailers, and cargo trailers.

The Montgomery County Sheriff's Office proposed an additional fee for the inspection of those vehicles in the amount of \$20, for the time and expense involved in inspecting and confirming if the vehicle was previously registered or entered as stolen.

Montgomery County Sheriff Jon Spunaugle was in attendance at the supervisors meeting June 14. Spunaugle said the fee was being proposed due to the law awaiting a signature from Iowa Gov. Kim Reynolds that would allow for ATV and UTV usage on county and

"We already inspect these vehicles now, but with the new law, I'm expecting we're going to be flooded with requests. Right now, we can do about 20 inspections over the summer, but I expect that will highly increase," Spunagle said.

He added, there are many of these types of vehicles that would all require an inspection prior to road use.

"There are utility vehicles all over that have no titles, and the owners have to get a form, and bring it back, and it has to be reviewed by a deputy. We've never charged for this before, but in the wake of the changes, I kind of feel this is something we need to do, and it's

already our time in expense to do it right now."

Spunaugle added it would be a one-time fee. Also, the fee involves an inspection for a vehicle that has never been titled or registered in the State of Iowa.

"In order to be eligible for road use, the vehicles have to be registered, and there are many of these types of vehicles that are for farm use that currently have never been registered," commented

Spunaugle stated that the fee was largely in place for utility vehicles that had seen multiple owners prior to being inspected.

"It's like when a four-wheeler is bought by someone who sells it to someone else, and the next thing you know, it's 15 people down the line and no one has registered the thing. With this new law coming into effect, if they want to get it registered to drive it on the road, it has to be inspected. For anyone who buys a brand-new one, or has a valid title, there's no need for an inspection."

The supervisors approved the resolution setting a \$20 fee for inspection services by the Montgomery County Sheriff's Office. In other business, the supervisors:

- Accepted a letter of resignation from general assistance director
- Approved the recorder's report of fees for May, in the amount of \$23,783.
- Approved the treasurer's ending fund balance for May, in the amount of \$11,250,
- Approved a tax transfer from General Basic to Secondary Roads, in the amount of \$649.

Post election audit conducted



Montgomery County conducted a post-audit on June 15.

The audit was conducted under the law designed to monitor and protect election processes. The audit was a perfect match to the results canvassed for the 2022 Primary Election.

The law requires the Secretary of State to call for a post-election audit in a randomly chosen precinct in each county. County Auditors supervise a hand count of votes in a given race on the ballots from that precinct. By random selection, Precinct 1 was audited. The polling place location for Precinct 1 is the Gold Fair Building.

"We have high confidence in the security measures we take for elections." said Montgomery County Auditor Stephanie Burke. "The postelection audit is a good way to prove that the confidence is well-founded."

domestic livestock - even when it is dry, like in hay.

Another relative that is poisonous is wild parsnip, which looks similar to poison hemlock, but has yellow flowers. However, wild parsnip prefers sunny areas like pastures and roadsides but will also inhabit low-lying areas. Wild parsnip plant parts contain a substance called psoralen, which can cause a condition known as "phytophotodermatitis." This reaction occurs when plant juice gets on the skin and the skin is exposed to sunlight. The results are skin reddening, rash development, and in severe cases, blisters and burning or scald-


ing type pain. If its oil touches the skin and then is exposed to sunlight, painful blisters will develop. It doesn't matter if the plant is flowering or not - avoid contact with it at all times. If exposed, wash it off as soon

as possible. Golden Alexander is often confused for wild parsnip, said Bond, but he included there are no issues with the Golden Alexander.

Leaves of three, let it be is the motto for poison ivy, which causes severe skin irritaion for weeks on end.

With poison ivy, each leaf has three parts or leaflets. Bond said leaves are often glossy and may show bumps or other deformities. A short plant along the ground, the flowers of poison ivy are greenwhite and produce white berries. The poisonous oil covers all parts of the plant, including the roots. Bond said burning the weed might seem like a good idea, but is not, as it can be carried on smoke. He added, poison ivy oil spreads from dead poison ivy plants, too, and can be picked up from other objects that touch the plant, such as fur

"Poison ovy seems to affect me more as I get older," said Bond. "I try to keep myself protected as much as possible when working



with these type of weeds."

Lastly, during the summer it's best to avoid stinging nettles, which is just what the name advertises. Plant hairs inject acid into the skin when brushed up against it. However, the reaction is less severe than with wild parsnip or poison ivy.


PATRICIA MAHER, 86

Yard and Garden: Staking Tomatoes

From ISU Extension

Tomatoes are one of the most popular vegetables grown at home. They benefit from staking and training to keep the sprawling plants off the ground.

Why is staking tomatoes beneficial?

Tomato plants trained so they are growing off the ground often produce better quality fruit than those allowed to sprawl on the ground. This is, in part because foliar disease problems are generally less severe due to better air circulation. Training tomatoes also conserves valuable garden space for gardeners with small plots. Plus, trained tomatoes are easier to cultivate and harvest.

When should I stake or

start training tomato plants? Tomatoes grow quickly after being planted in the spring. You should have the materials needed for whatever method of training you plan to use on-hand at the time of planting. Many gardeners will set up the equipment necessary for training at the time of planting. Early- to mid-June is when most tomato plants are large enough to start actively training and staking plants.

What methods can be used to stake a tomato plant?

Training methods vary, but the three most common methods for home gardeners are the wire cage, single stake and weave sys-

Utilizing a wire cage is one of the most popular methods for training tomatoes because it requires less attention. This method works for both types of tomatoes but is ideal for determinate varieties. Manufactured cages are readily available at garden centers. They tend to be too small, especially for indeterminate varieties and can sometimes be unstable and easily topple.


A tomato cage can be constructed by creating a cylinder from concrete reinforcing wire or similar material with a mesh large enough to allow the fruit to be harvested. For most tomato plants a wire cage 20 to 24 inches in diameter and 4 to 5 feet tall is ideal. Remove the horizontal wire at the bottom of the cage and stick the vertical wires or "feet" into the soil. Both manufactured and homemade cages can be further stabilized by attaching the cage to one or two stakes. When utilizing wire cages, space plants 2 to 3 feet apart. As the plant grows, simply ensure stems stay within the wire cage.

Training using a single stake requires placing one 7- to 8-footlong stake 1 to 2 feet into the ground positioned 3 to 4 inches from the plant. As the tomato grows, tie the plant to the stake with stretch ties or strips of nylon hose or cloth about every 12 inches along the stem. Tie the material in a loose figure 8, with the stake in one loop and the stem in the other.

When utilizing this method of pruning, pinch out the side shoots or suckers that form in the axils of the leaf and stem. Tomatoes that are staked can be planted 1.5 to 2 feet apart in rows spaced 4 to 5 feet apart. This training method works well with indeterminate tomato cultivars, but is not recommended for determinate types, those that grow to a certain height, stop, then flower and set all their fruit within a short period of time.

If you grow a lot of tomato plants, the weave system works well. Plant tomatoes 18 to 24 inches apart within rows spaced 4 to 5 feet apart. Drive a 6- to 7-foot-long stake one foot into the ground every two plants along the row. Use a sturdy metal post 7- to 8-foot long driven 1 to 2 feet into the ground at each end of the row. When the plants are 12 to 14 inches tall, begin the weave at 8 to 10 inches off the ground. Tie twine to the end post and sweep the twine past the two plants along one side of the row. Then loop the twine around the first stake and pull it tight.

Continue this process while pulling the twine tight as you go down the row keeping tension on the twine all the way down. At the end of the row, make a loop around the end post and turn around to repeat the process on the other side of the row, enclosing the plants between the two strings of twine. When you get back to the starting point, tie the twine tightly to the end post. As the plants continue to grow, add another layer of twine 6 to 8 inches above the last.

A tale of two jungles

Texpect most Depression-era towns with a rail-**⊥**road depot had a hobo hangout; a place where transients made their Mulligan stew and caught a snooze while waiting to bum their next ride.



Inflation swallows up savings

: What are you hearing from Iowans about inflation?

A: So far this year, I've met with Iowans in nearly two-thirds of my 99 county annual meetings. Without exception, I've heard deep concerns about inflation and a looming economic recession. The volume has turned up as the Biden economy has led to \$5 gas with no relief in sight. What the Biden administration insisted was "transitory" has proven to be long-term and painful. U.S. inflation hit a 40-year high, soaring to 8.6 percent, fueled by the reckless partisan spending spree enacted a year ago in March. The poorly named American Rescue Plan was pushed through on a party line vote when the Senate Democrat Majority Leader used the process of budget reconciliation to avoid having to work across the aisle with Republicans. The Biden administration leaned on the levers of government controlled by one political party and look what happened. What did the Biden administration expect after Congress had already injected the economy with \$4 trillion in pandemic relief spending? They opened a fire hose on the U.S. economy and ignored warnings from Larry Summers, the Harvard economist and former Treasury Secretary and Director of National Economic Council under the Clinton and Obama administrations. He said more federal spending would fuel the fires of inflation. You bet your boots it did. The highest inflation in 40 years is eating into savings and making it harder than ever for lower and middle income Americans to help them for Americans to make ends meet. The rising cost of consumer goods and services, from food to fuel, utilities and rent, is forcing families to dial back on individuals from taxation; double the size of the zero dining out and rethink summer vacation plans. More Iowans are forced to dip into their hard-earned savings that's been eroded by inflation to pay the bills. Many Americans recall the Great Inflation years of the Carter administration that reached more than 13 percent in 1980. Today, homeowners, farmers and small businesses are buckling down in anticipation of higher interest rates that it will take to tame inflation. In the meantime, I'm hearing from Iowans across the state who are struggling to pay for groceries and fill up the gas tank from one week to the next. Farmers struggled to find fertilizer and afford diesel to get their crops in the ground. Many are worried about paying for fuel at harvest time. Small businesses are stretched thin with soaring transportation, production and labor costs. I've urged President Biden to stop his War on American Energy. Instead of begging foreign dictators to increase production, roll back the executive orders he implemented that are driving up the cost of gas.

Q: How would your Middle-Class Savings and **Investment Act help Iowans?**

A: As former chairman of the tax-writing Senate Finance Committee, I've worked to enact fiscally responsible tax policies that allow Americans to keep more of their hard-earned money and incentivize thrift, savings and investment. I wrote pro-growth tax policies during the George W. Bush and Trump administrations that closed overseas corporate tax loopholes to bring investment back to the United States and foster job creation, small business expansion and entrepreneurship in communities across the country, particularly among minorities. Priming the economic pump with pro-growth tax policies helps grow wages, savings and investment. Today, Americans, especially seniors on fixed incomes, are cash-strapped by 40-year high inflation. I'm working to deliver relief through the federal tax code. Under the Biden economy, the purchasing power of American consumers is shrinking and squeezing budgets, eating up paychecks and swallowing savings. Middle class families, retirees, small businesses and farmers have watched as their savings erode in value while still facing taxes on gains that may not even keep pace with inflation. This creates a perverse incentive to spend now rather than save, further fueling inflation. The Middle-Class Savings and Investment Act would target relief on interest income save and invest. Specifically, it would exclude up to \$600 interest income for married couples/\$300 for percent (lowest) tax bracket for long-term capital gains and qualified dividends, indexing the income thresholds to inflation; eliminate the marriage penalty on the Net Investment Tax, which subjects some income to an additional 3.8 percent tax, indexing its income threshold to inflation; and, increase the maximum 'savers credit' that an individual may receive for contributing to a qualified retirement account and expanding eligibility to more taxpayers. Making it pay to save, rather than spend is one tool Congress can use to help rein in inflation without the harmful consequences of more reckless federal spending, dangerous windfall profit taxes, or wage and price



'It's time to act' says Schmid on county IT director position

The Montgomery County Board of Supervisors has narrowed the field on a replacement IT director.

The supervisors discussed hiring for the new position at the regular meeting June 14. Supervisor Donna Robinson said she made contact with representatives with Iowa Counties Information Technology and had received a recommendation.

"They looked over the resumes that we received, and they gave us a recommendation of two individuals to set up interviews with, so we're now in the stage where we need to set up interviews for the proposed candidates," Robinson said.

Robinson added she was looking to set up interviews with the candidates this week, and the interviews would likely be in closed session.

"Last time we had an ICIT representative sit in, and I think it would be wise to have someone from that group sit in on the interview. I'd also like to have Beau Boeye sit in as well, as they ask the right questions, know the lingo, and have good insight into the right candidate we need for the position," commented Robinson.

Supervisor Charla Schmid was in favor of holding the interviews as quickly as possible.

"We need an IT director, and while Beau Boeye is doing a great job for us, he's not inter-

ested in taking over the position full-time, so it's time to act,' said Schmid.

Robinson said she would call the two candidates, as well as the ICIT representatives and Boeye, to set up a date this week for interviews.

The supervisors also heard an update from Jim Richardson with Montgomery County Secondary Roads regarding a letter of support to submit with an application for a Iowa DNR County Creek Sign Grant.

"There's a grant available to put signs with the names of creeks on the area bridges, which would familiarize residents of the county with the names and locations of all of our county creeks, and give them a bet-

ter understanding of our water

resources," Richardson said.


The anticipated location of the signs were:

- West of M-37 on H-12 -Indian Creek (Lincoln township) • H-12- Walnut Creek (by the Hungry Canyons sign- Sherman township)
- H-20 Walnut Creek (Sherman township)

- Old Highway 34 West Tarkio Creek (Red Oak town-
- M-37 Walnut Creek (Garfield township)
- H-54 West Tarkio Creek (Grant township)

Richardson said the signs would be the standard green color, and simply include the name of the creek on the sign.

"Most generally, they have these signs on the state highways, and thanks to this grant process we can include them on the county highways as well," commented Richardson.

The supervisors approved the letter of support to include with the DNR grant application.

Audit report for City of Red Oak released

Staff Report

Auditor of State Rob Sand has released an audit report on the City of Red Oak..

The City's receipts totaled \$8,670,917 for the year ending June 30, a 31.2% decrease from the prior year. Disbursements for the year ended June 30, 2021 totaled \$8,367,458, a 19.6% decrease from the prior year.

The decreases are due primarily to the City not issuing new debt for projects in the fiscal year 2021 and the decreased capital project spending.

Sand reported eight findings related to the receipt and disbursement of taxpayer funds. The findings address issues such as a lack of segregation of duties, disbursements exceeding budget, a deficit fund balance in the Capital Projects Fund, and questionable donations.

Sand provided the City with recommendations to address each of the findings. Seven of the eight findings discussed above are repeated from the prior year.

• Segregation of duties: The state auditor's office stated the City of Red Oak, the Volunteer Fire and Rescue Association and the Library Foundation should review their operating procedures to obtain the maximum Capital Projects Fund: The audithe circumstances utilizing currently available staff, including elected officials to provide additional controls through review of financial transactions, reconciliations and financial report. The reviews should be documented by the signature or initials of the reviewer and the date of the

The City of Red Oak's response was that it will continue to do its best in segregation of duties, and that they have already increased reviews with initials or signatures by an inde-

Foundation and Volunteer Fire and Rescue Association would be asked to follow this procedure. The response was accepted by the state auditor's office.

 Disbursements exceeding budget: The auditor's office stated disbursements during the year ending June 30, 2021 exceeded the amount budgeted in the community and economic development function. In addition, disbursements exceeded the amounts budgeted in the community and economic development and debt service functions prior to the budget amendment. Chapter 384.20 of the Code of Iowa states, in part, "public monies may not be expended or encumbered except under an annual or continuing appropriation." The recommendation was that the budget should have been amended in accordance with Chapter 384.18 of the Code of Iowa before disbursements were allowed to exceed the budget.

The City of Red Oak responded that it tried to watch its budget and will continue to monitor and try to make any amendments prior to it taking place. The response was accepted by the auditor's office.

• Deficit fund balance in internal control possible under tor's office noted the Capital Projects Fund had a deficit balance of \$554,409 at June 30, 2021, and recommended that the city should investigate alternatives to eliminate the deficit to return the fund to a sound financial position.

The city responded that it has worked on getting its projects cleaned up and closed out. It leaves a project in a deficit until all receipts have been received before it is closed out. The response was accepted by the auditor's office.

• Questionable Donations:

pendent reviewer. The Library The auditor's office cited donations of \$30,000 to the Montgomery County Development Corporation and \$10,000 to the Red Oak Chamber and Industry Association. The report indicated they were not aware of any statutory authority for the City to donate public funds to private non-profit organizations, and that the city should cease said donations.

The response from The City of Red Oak was that these contributions were in support of economic development activities as authorized by Chapter 15A of the Code of Iowa, and that the Red Oak City Council would adopt a resolution to clarify and support this. The response was accepted by the state auditor's

The Red Oak City Council has a fiduciary responsibility to provide oversight of the City's operations and financial transactions. Oversight is typically defined as the "watchful and responsible care" a governing body exercises in its fiduciary

FSA accepting nominations for farmers to serve on local county committees

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) is now accepting nominations for county committee members. Elections will occur in certain Local Administrative Areas (LAA) for members. LAAs are elective areas for FSA committees in a single county or multi-county jurisdiction. This may include LAAs that are focused on an urban or suburban area.

County committee members make important decisions about how federal farm programs are administered locally. All nomination forms for the 2022 election must be postmarked or received in the

local FSA office by Aug. 1, 2022. "It is a priority for USDA to integrate equity into its decisionmaking and policymaking, and that starts with our local FSA county committees," said Matt Russell, State Executive Director for FSA in Iowa. "We need enthusiastic, diverse leaders to serve other agricultural producers on these committees as we work to build equitable

systems and programming inclusive of all employees and all of our are made up of three to 11 members who serve three-year terms. customers. I ask that you consider making a difference in your community by nominating yourself, or another agricultural producer, to serve on your local FSA county committee.'

Russell said agricultural producers who participate or cooperate in a USDA program and reside in the LAA that is up for election this year, may be nominated for candidacy for the county committee. A cooperating producer is someone who has provided information about their farming or ranching operation to FSA, even if they have not applied or received program benefits. Individuals may nominate themselves or others and qualifying organizations may also nominate candidates. USDA encourages minority producers, women, and beginning farmers or ranchers to nominate, vote and hold office.

Nationwide, more than 7,700 dedicated members of the agricultural community serve on FSA county committees. The committees

Producers serving on FSA county committees play a critical role in the day-to-day operations of the agency. Committee members are vital to how FSA carries out disaster programs, as well as conservation, commodity and price support programs, county office employment and other agricultural issues.

Producers should contact their local FSA office today to register and find out how to get involved in their county's election, including if their LAA is up for election this year. To be considered, a producer must be registered and sign an FSA-669A nomination form. The form and other information about FSA county committee elections are available at fsa.usda.gov/elections.

Election ballots will be mailed to eligible voters beginning Nov. 7, 2022. Producers can find their local USDA Service Center at farmers.gov/service-locator.

Audit report for MCMH released

For public record, the accounting firm of Seim Johnson, LLP released an audit report for Montgomery County Memorial Hospital, Red Oak, Iowa on April 18, 2022:

The hospital's operating revenue totaled \$42,690,192 for the year ended June 30, 2021, a .15% increase from the prior year. Total revenue included \$41,942,456 in net patient service revenue and \$747,736 in other operating revenue. Net nonoperating revenue was \$7,334,113, which was comprised of \$83,354 in investment income, \$5,286,129 noncapital grants and contributions, \$1,951,128 in county tax revenue, \$186,062 in net rental activity, and \$172,560 in interest expense.

Operating expenses for the year totaled \$48,797,451, a 2.1% decrease from the prior year, and included \$29,731,632 for salaries and employee benefits; \$14,549,183 supplies and other expenses; \$2,078,224 for purchased services and professional fees; and \$2,438,412 for depreciation and amortization.
