DeVries wins reserve champion 4-H market steer at Iowa State Fair

Last week was a very exciting and memorable one for Lainey DeVries of Red Oak. DeVries, the daughter of Dave and Tammy DeVries and a senior at Red Oak High School, exhibited the reserve grand champion 4-H market steer at the

At the state fair, DeVries' steer weighed 1349 and was shown in the Charolais division, where she first won the class of six steers, followed by the Charolais division. This allowed her to compete in the championship show.

"When we left home, we felt that he was in a position to do well, but the state of Iowa is known to have a very competitive steer show," Lainey recalled. "We were hoping for the best, but I knew it would be tough.

Even after the judge selected the grand champion, she said she still felt confident in her steer. "I knew he was special, as I had been competi-

tive with the champion steer all year," she said.

Having a steer selected as reserve grand champion at a state fair is an experience most exhibitors don't get to experience. DeVries said she fully understands its rarity and said it's something she'll remember forever. She added it's going to be extremely tough to place that high, or higher,

"This has been an unforgettable experience, but next year's goal might have to be just a little bit higher."

At the state fair, grand and reserve champions of each species participated in the sale of champions, another rare and overly memorable experience.

'The sale of champions was exhilarating as it was something that I had never experienced before," said DeVries. "Bringing my steer onto the purple shavings of the sale ring was an experience I will never forget. My steer sold for \$65,500 to Fareway."

DeVries, a member of the Stennett Panthers 4-H Club, has been showing cattle for nine years.

School board approves of unused equipment disposal

The Red Oak School Board tackled a light agenda at its regular meeting Aug. 24.

Superintendent Ron Lorenz discussed options for the disposal of old lockers and a fiveman sled.

"We're working to clean up the stadium area a little bit, and we have old lockers that date back to the 1960s and 70s that we took out of the field house. The blocking sled also hasn't been used in quite some time," advised Lorenz.

As the law says the board has discretion to dispose of those items in any legal means, there was no need to have a hearing with the items valued at less than \$5,000.

"We would be able to dispose of the items using Purple Wave, which is the online auction service that we used to

will be disposed of locally.

"It will provide the board with flexibility to use district management funds for either early retirement programs or locally defined teacher recruitment incentives," said Lorenz.

The board also wanted to see some clarification regarding open enrollment regulations, specifically funding deadlines, as well as adequate school funding, and mental health reports.

Also on the agenda was approval of a bid for a replacement boiler at the technology center. After receiving an estimated cost of \$291,000, and the district received two bids, with the low bid from Ray Martin at \$163,000.

"The bid from Ray Martin was considerably less expensive, and we were really glad about that," commented Lorenz.

Piggies Paradise celebrates success

Piggies Paradise, the local guinea pig rescue shelter in Red Oak will be celebrating its first anniversary at its location at 422 E. Reed St. in October.

The shelter was spearheaded by co-directors Tabatha Updegrove and Jolene Studey, who started operating out of their homes in February 2020, before the increased need in the community spurred Updegrove and Studey to open up the Reed Street location.

Studey said the shelter had some recent good news. They received their licensing earlier this month.

"We've trying to get licensed since last November, with COVID, and the fact that the inspector was in the hospital a couple of times, they told us to just keep doing what we were doing. We passed the state inspection with flying colors, and he said he couldn't nitpick anything we were doing,"

Studey said. The shelter is currently housing roughly 100 guinea pigs, and Studey and Updegrove estimate that they have adopted out more than 500 guinea pigs since the shelter was started. Updegrove said they take in any in need.

"We take in sick ones, and those that are older. Guinea pigs can live up to 10 years, so we have guinea pigs that are seven or eight year olds, and they usually don't get adopted out, so this is their sanctuary. We're currently the largest licensed guinea pig sanctuary in Iowa, and we're the only licensed shelter in Southwest Iowa," commented Updegrove.

Having the distinction, Updegrove said, is a good feeling, because it creates a positive environment for the guinea pigs

"We have a place for them where they are going to be safe, and fed, and happy, which is exactly what they need," Updegrove said.

Studey said the shelter is in a near-constant state of taking in and adopting out guinea pigs.

"I say it's a revolving door. We adopt out, and within a day, we have the cage refilled. I have a waiting list of people currently waiting to surrender their guinea pigs. If we had a larger building we could adopt more, but currently we are unable.

We also have some in foster care," Studey

advised. Studey attributes the revolving door quality to would-be pet owners not knowing all the facts when it comes to adopting and taking care of guinea pigs.

"People get them, and they don't realize how long they live, and they are a higher-maintenance animal to take care of than a hamster. They're awake 14 hours a day, unlike a hamster, which sleeps most of the day. They need veggies every day, they need fleece bedding, and hay 24/7. I think in many cases, parents buy one for their kids, and the kids simply can't keep up with the care," stated Studey.

Updegrove added that since they spend the majority of the time in a cage, and are less interactive than a dog or a cat, that it can sometimes be easier to surrender one than another kind of animal.

As Piggies Paradise has grown as an organization, so has their reputation, and Studey said people have driven for hours to

Lewellen chosen as county safety coordinator

The Montgomery County Board of Supervisors has made a decision regarding a new safety coordinator.

At the regular meeting Aug. 16, Supervisor Mike Olson said they had narrowed the prospective candidates down to one choice.

"Charla Scmid and I conducted three interviews on Aug. 15. All three candidates had a lot of good points, and all three were very good. After considerable conversation and thought, our top choice for the position was Morgan Lewellen, and that is our recommendation," Olson said.

Supervisor Donna Robinson asked if hours, job description, and the wage were all presented and deemed acceptable by Lewellen. Olson confirmed that Lewellen approved of the job duties and the salary. Lewellen currently serves as a dispatcher in the Montgomery County Communications Center. Olson felt she should take over the position immediately.

"In this, I think the sooner we get them in place the better. We can get Lewellen in place and get her exposed to what she's going to be dealing with and move on from there," said Olson.

The supervisors unanimously approved the appointment of Morgan Lewellen as safety coordinator.

The supervisors also heard comments from Jan Norris, who had a few follow-up comments to a presentation given to the supervisors at the Aug. 10 meeting by Kaylee Langrell from Turnkey Logistics, who also represented Summit Carbon Solutions. When asked about the safety of carbon gas pipelines, Langrell's response, according to Norris, was incorrect according to the Federal Pipeline Regulatory

"After 50 people were injured in a town in Mississippi two years ago, a full investigation was conducted and found that CO² was what had entered the victims, not hydrogen sulfide, as Langrell stated. In fact, because of that accident, new rulemaking is being conducted to update standards for CO² pipelines. Imposing the same safety standards for natural gas pipelines was found to be

inadequate," Norris said.

that this pipeline project was en. She urged the Montgomery County Planning and Zoning Commission to take preemptive

"The commission should be asked to draft a pipeline ordinance immediately. The commission has placed a one-year moratorium on wind energy, and the Southwest Iowa Planning Council is helping with comprehensive plans, but the pipeline is urgent. I am hopeful opposition will be successful in stopping an

Iowa Utilities Board permit from being issued, but it's the job of the supervisors to prepare the county in case it goes through," commented Norris. "I am hopeful the planning and zoning commission will be able to draft an effective and comprehensive pipeline ordinance to protect Montgomery County and our taxpayers. We will have to take our chances whether or not the state will supercede it, but our county deserves the effort."

Lastly, Supervisors Chair Mark Peterson issued a statement to the department heads that more work was needed for the Nishna Productions employees.

"Nishna Productions is doing shredding for us, and they're running short on work. If there are offices that can use that, it would be good to get that material taken care of. Dan Wright has offered to move things around, and a vault is being earmarked to keep secured documents locked up until the Nishna Productions workers can get to it," advised Peterson.

She said her favorite part about showing cattle is the competitiveness and all of the people she has been able to meet through the industry. "Something that most people don't know about showing cattle is the discipline it takes to prepare these animals for show. It takes lots of early mornings and late nights and hours of brushing, washing, rinsing, feeding, and showmanship practice," she said.

Leading up to state fair, DeVries said her daily routine with her steer included bringing him into the barn before sun-up, rinsing him and brushing him to train and grow his hair. She also had to rinse and brush his hair again in the afternoon before turning him outside after sundown.

DeVries steer was purchased in October 2021 from Ty Webster with Webster Cattle Company in Powersville, Mo.





A problem in knowing the value of seeding clouds is that atmospheric conditions change constantly.

A widely accepted position today is that cloud seeding is more likely to slightly increase snowfall than to effect rain, but in extreme and extended drought even a small amount of moisture may be

COVID remains a presence in county updates Beason

Montgomery County Public Health is continuing to monitor COVID-19 cases in the county, and is noticing a bit of an uptick

Montgomery County Public Health coordinator Samantha Beeson met with the supervisors at the regular meeting Aug. 16. Beeson gave an update on the current COVID-19 totals, and advised a total of 2,375 tests have been given in the county.

"For our 14 day total, we've had 41 cases, in the last seven days we've had 17 cases, and in the last three days we've had three cases. Our total vaccine administration is at 55.5%," Beeson explained.

Based on the numbers, Beeson said it showed that COVID-19 was still prevalent in the county, and the recommendations were still the same as they were in the

The Centers for Disease able at the Montgomery County Control and Prevention have updated the quarantine guidance a little bit. If you're exposed, there's no quarantine requirement. You're just supposed to wear a mask for the 10 days of your incubation period," advised Beeson. "When it comes to isolation, it's five days at home, five days wearing a mask. They are no longer recommending testing asymptomatic people. We haven't seen anything from the state yet, those are guidelines from the CDC," Beeson said.

Montgomery County Public Health Office still had COVID test kits available for those needing to be tested. Also, Beeson said anyone look-"Vaccines are avail-

Memorial Hospital Physicians Clinic, or Internal Hy-Vee, and Medicap Pharmacy. We're also available to provide them to anyone who can't get to the clinic or if they're homebound. We will collect the vaccine and administer it to the homebound resident," stated Beeson.

Beeson also advised the that visitors received from county had yet to see any confirmed cases of Monkeypox.

"So far, Pottawattamie County is the closest it has gotten to us. It's spread through close contact with an infected person, or by sharing clothes. It's not transmitted like COVID, so you're not as likely to get Monkeypox as you are to get COVID.'

Besson said her office is also working with the area schools to prepare kids for the upcoming school year and vaccination requirements.

We're working to make sure all of the incoming kindergartners, seventh, and 12th graders

all have the required immunizations before the start of school. It's a state law that if they don't have them, they're not supposed to attend school."

Beeson also advised the supervisors her employees are working to keep providing the same quality of coverage from the General Assistance office former administrator Sonia Jackson, who recently retired from the post.

"We're still learning the ins and outs of everything, like the payee information, and general information. We'd also like to sit down at some point and review what the expectations are," Beeson said.

Doggy dip event at Red Oak pool Aug. 28

The Red Oak Park and Tree Board held its regular monthly meeting Aug. 11.

On the agenda was approval of a request to hold a doggie dip event at the Red Oak Pool from 5 to 7 p.m on Aug. 28. Sara Orme has been spearheading the event, suggested waiving the fee to use the pool. Park Board Chairman Bill Drey was in agreement to waive

The board approved a motion to waive the rental fee, and an insur-

Cost to attend is \$5 for one dog and two humans, and an additional \$1 for each additional human. Only cash or checks will be accepted, and season passes will not be honored.

Additionally, there are some guidelines and rules in place for everyone who participates in the doggie dip event.

• All dogs must be licensed and up-to-date on vaccines, including Rabies, Distemper/PARVO, and Bordetella.

• Owners are responsible for any damage or injury caused by their dogs, and must clean up after their dogs if they make a mess. • Participants must be 18 years or older to bring a dog; children

are welcome to attend with a parent or guardian. • All dogs must be at least six months old and on a leash. Participants are requested to leave toys at home.

• Finally, all participants must sign a 2022 doggie dip waiver, which will be available at the door.

All proceeds from the event will be donated to the Heart of Southwest Iowa Animal Coalition. The board also approved a request from the Friends of the Red

Oak Trails to hold Trick or Treat on the Trail from 4:30-6:30 p.m. Oct. 27 at the Evergreen Cemetery. Beau Boeye, representing the organization, said the event would be run the same way as it has been in years past.

"Our back-up plan would be like we did last year. We still need to

get confirmation, but in the event of rain, we'd plan to hold the event at the Montgomery County Family YMCA," Boeye said.

Boeye gave an update on the Inman Trail project, a joint venture between the Friends of the Red Oak Trail, the Red Oak School District, and the City of Red Oak.

"It initially spearheaded from our Heritage Hill walking trail, connecting the downtown to Chautauqua Park. Then we really started focusing on the connection between Chautauqua Park and Evergreen Cemetery. After talking with cemetery superintendent Brad Baker about the congestion at Inman, and how it's causing damage to the cemetery grass, our priorities shifted and we saw a bigger opportunity that we could tackle," said Boeye.

Boeye said they are envisioning a trail that runs from the southeast entrance and exit of the cemetery to the Inman property, taking the trail through the campus up Inman Hill to Irene Court.

"We've discussed the project with city administrator Brad Wright. Wright said there's a city right of way between some houses there that connect Irene Court to Chautauqua Drive, so now we're looking at a complete trail segment that would take people from Inman Drive to Chautauqua Park," Boeye explained.

Another possible portion of the project would be a parking lot on the east side of the Inman campus that would provide additional loading and unloading space in the area. The final piece of the puzzle is funding.

"We're currently looking at Transportation Alternative Program funding which has been used for all of the trails that we've erected here. That would provide 80% of the project's funding, and we would pay 20% of it. We're also looking at a partnership between us, the City of Red Oak, and the Red Oak District. The city and school both love the idea, and conversations are moving forward, and we're waiting to hear from the engineer on cost estimates and see if the project can be done in total, or in phases," advised Boeye.

The board also approved a request to build a free library box at Little Wilson Park on Sunny Slope Drive. Drey offered to provide assistance to dig the hole for the post for the box if needed.

SWITA receives grant for new buses

Rep. Cindy Axne (IA-03) applauded two new grants to update and replace Iowa's aging statewide bus fleet Friday, Aug. 19. Currently, nearly 63% of the state's public buses exceed the federal standard for use of life, according to the Iowa Public Transit Association.

The \$27.8 million provided by the U.S. Department of Transportation includes a \$12M grant for the Iowa Department of Transportation (IDOT) to purchase 90 new buses, cutaways, and vans for 26 of the state's transit systems. The project is intended to improve transit system conditions, service reliability, and lower maintenance

costs for providers across the state.

The new funding also includes a \$15.8 million grant to IDOT for local transit agencies to purchase battery electric buses and charging equipment, as well as transit facilities construction and workforce development activities.

That \$15.8 million grant will support the following agencies in the Third District:

5 replacement buses for Heart of Iowa Regional Transit Agency (HIRTA).

1 replacement and 2 expansions for Southwest Iowa Transit Agency (SWITA).

adopt, and surrender, guinea

"The farthest person who has come to us so far is a woman from South Dakota. She wanted to adopt a female guinea pig as a cage mate for the guinea pig she still had. She went all the way to Omaha, but couldn't find one that she wanted. She went all the way back to South Dakota, then contacted us, and the next weekend, she came back down to us and adopted one of our shelter guinea pigs," Studey said "As for a surrender, I believe someone came from about three hours away to surrender the guinea pig to us because they didn't trust their local animal shelter."

Updegrove and Studev also made it very clear that they are not guinea pig breeders, they are a rescue shelter.

"Sometimes we get a pregnant mother and the baby guinea pigs are born here, but that's the extent. We do not breed guinea pigs in this facility," advised Updegrove.

The shelter has received constant praise from people both in and outside the community. Studey said it's a great feeling.

"I'm a big animal lover, and this is perfect for me. They all have their own different personality, and it's just so much fun," Studey said. "They're born prey, and their first instinct is to run and hide, but once you get them picked up, they love to cuddle."

The shelter has also implemented some new features. They will deliver a guinea pig adopted guinea pig to a distance of up to 75 miles, for a \$30 fee

The shelter can also board

on vacation for an extended period, at a cost of \$10 per day, per guinea pig. All food, hay, and vegetables would be

Among the tips for guinea pig owners, Studey recommends a two-week quarantine, especially if it is being introduced into a cage with other guinea pigs, to prevent sickness.

Cage sizes for one guinea pig is 39" by 21" or larger. For two, a cage size of 50" by 30" or Updegrove. larger, and for four, 62" by 30"

Also, since guinea pigs don't produce their own Vitamin C, they have to have a diet of fruits and vegetables every day. Among the fruits safe for guinea pigs to consume are blueberries, bananas, apricots with no pit, seedless apples, melons, cherries, grapes, cranberries, pears, raspberries, pineapple, and strawberries.

When it comes to vegetables, guinea pigs need romaine lettuce, spring mix, parsley, cilantro, carrots, or sweet peppers daily. Two to four times a week, the guinea pigs need green beans, snap peas, squash, tomatoes, arugula, cabbage, cucumbers, or celery.

One to two times a week, the guinea pigs can eat asparagus, spinach, brussells sprouts, corn on the cob, cauliflower, and broccoli.

Foods that absolutely should not be fed to a guinea pig include dairy, potatoes, mushrooms, coconut, avocado, nuts, rhubarb, onions, garlic, hot peppers, and iceberg lettuce.

Studey and Updegrove both said that whether a person guinea pigs for families going adopts from the shelter or not,
